OPENING STATEMENT

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THE HONORABLE HAROLD M. WILLIAMS, CHAIRMAN SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION

AT THE

COMMISSION'S MEETING WITH PROFESSOR LOUIS LOSS AND HIS ADVISERS CONCERNING THE AMERICAN LAW INSTITUTE'S PROPOSED FEDERAL SECURITIES CODE

I AM PLEASED TO WELCOME TO THE COMMISSION THIS AFTERNOON PROFESSOR LOUIS LOSS AND HIS DISTINGUISHED ADVISERS, MANY OF WHOM ARE FORMER MEMBERS OF THIS COMMISSION OR ITS STAFF, TO DISCUSS THE AMERICAN LAW INSTITUTE'S PROPOSED FEDERAL SECURITIES CODE. THE INSTITUTE, PROFESSOR LOSS, AND THE MANY INDIVIDUALS WHO HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO THIS PROJECT DESERVE CONGRATULATIONS FOR THEIR SCHOLARSHIP, THEIR INSIGHT, AND THEIR PERSEVERANCE. THE CODE REPRESENTS WHAT WOULD BE A COMPREHENSIVE STATUTORY SCHEME WHICH, IN PART, CODIFIES FORTY-FIVE YEARS OF EXPERIENCE IN FEDERAL SECURITIES REGULATION, AND, IN PART, SUBSTANTIALLY REVISES THE LAW. PERHAPS NO GROUP COULD BE MORE QUALIFIED TO UNDERTAKE THAT VERY DIFFICULT TASK THAN THE ONE WE WELCOME HERE TODAY.

COMMISSIONERS INDIVIDUALLY AND THE STAFF COLLECTIVELY

HAVE DEVOTED A GREAT DEAL OF TIME OVER THE PAST YEAR AND A

HALF TO REVIEWING THE PROPOSED CODE. BECAUSE OF THE

COMPLEXITY OF THE CODE, THIS EFFORT HAS DEMANDED A SIGNIFICANT

SHARE OF OUR LIMITED PERSONNEL RESOURCES. IN ADDITION,

COMMISSIONER LOOMIS HAS BEEN INVOLVED IN THE CODE PROJECT

SINCE ITS INCEPTION, AND MANY OF OUR STAFF MEMBERS HAVE

PROVIDED INPUT DURING THE COURSE OF THE CODE'S DEVELOPMENT.

THUS, THE COMMISSION'S OVERALL INVOLVEMENT WITH THE CODE

HAS BEEN BOTH LONG-STANDING AND DETAILED.

Moreover, as many of you know, the staff of the Commission has been meeting with Professor Loss and some of his advisers for nearly a year now. As the agency charged by Congress with responsibility for administering the securities laws, our input into the Code is obviously important to its supporters. I believe that the experience

AND INSIGHT OF OUR STAFF HAS PROVIDED A NECESSARY SUPPLEMENT
TO THE PROJECT'S OWN COLLECTIVE WISDOM. IN TURN, THIS
EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION HAS PROVIDED A USEFUL FRAMEWORK FOR
THE COMMISSION'S STUDY OF THE CODE.

THE COMMISSION HAS NOT, HOWEVER, TAKEN A FORMAL

POSITION ON THE MERITS OF THE CODE. INDEED, THE CODE'S

PROPOSED TREATMENT OF A NUMBER OF ISSUES IS OF SERIOUS

CONCERN TO THE COMMISSION. ACCORDINGLY, WE WOULD LIKE TO

USE THIS MEETING TO HEAR THE VIEWS OF PROFESSOR LOSS AND

HIS ADVISERS BEFORE WE COME TO ANY JUDGMENT ON THESE ISSUES.

IN THE PROCESS, WE MAY BE ABLE TO RESOLVE SOME OF THESE

MATTERS, OR AT LEAST TO DEFINE MORE PRECISELY THE NATURE

OF ANY DIFFERENCES OF OPINION THAT MAY EXIST.

TO THAT END, IT SEEMS MOST USEFUL FOR US TO PROCEED

WITH A DISCUSSION OF THE SPECIFIC MATTERS OF CONCERN TO THE

COMMISSION, RECOGNIZING THAT NOT ALL OF THESE ARE OF EQUAL

IMPORTANCE. THEREFORE, IT WOULD BE HELPFUL TO US IF PROFESSOR

LOSS, OR ONE OF HIS ADVISERS, WOULD SUMMARIZE THE CODE'S

APPROACH ON EACH OF THE VARIOUS TOPICS, AND THEN WE WILL

HAVE WHATEVER DISCUSSION SEEMS APPROPRIATE. TO ASSIST US IN

THAT DISCUSSION, I HAVE ASKED THE OFFICE OF THE GENERAL

COUNSEL TO PARTICIPATE BY ASKING QUESTIONS AND CLARIFYING

POINTS WHERE NEEDED.

THE RESULT OF THESE DISCUSSIONS, I HOPE, WILL BE A GREATER MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING OF THE ISSUES, AS WELL AS OF THE CODE ITSELF. WITH SUCH AN UNDERSTANDING, WE CAN BETTER APPROACH THE PROCESS OF CONGRESSIONAL CONSIDERATION OF THE CODE, A PROCESS IN WHICH WE WILL ALL PLAY A SIGNIFICANT ROLE.
