Dear Judge Lasker:

When I read in one of the newspapers of the Jewish community that no one had written in support of Ivan Boesky and that perhaps a supportive letter might help you decide to be lenient in his sentencing, I decided to write you. I've known Mr. Boesky for five years. Our relationship was that of a fund-raiser to a donor, but as those relationships are the heart of my work of 18 years, please do not dismiss it lightly.

There have been many very rich people with whom I have worked. Too often they have not seen the professional, only the end result, which is either the success of the dinner, the success of the campaign, or their own image in the community. But Mr. Boesky was never that way.

I worked with him at the time he was most catered to by the public. I was the fund raiser and his was the dinner and the campaign. He was always polite. He was always encouraging and optimistic, and warm and personal. He was never too busy to return my phone calls, never impatient when we spoke. He was always generous with his home and his time as well as his money. I always felt that Mr. Boesky respected me as a professional and as a human being, not as a stepping stone. He was always gracious, and supportive and complimentary.

I still see Mr. Boesky at the institution I represent and with all his problems he is still the same warm friendly person who takes time to say thank you for the smallest courtesy.

It seems to me that a man is the sum of his parts. The part of Mr. Boesky that I know has been very fine and I am proud to have worked with him. I hope this letter will help you to decide with leniency in his favor.
