IN PARTICULAR, THE COMMISSION WILL GIVE SPECIAL RECOGNITION TO SEVERAL EMPLOYEES WHO HAVE MADE OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE CAUSE OF INVESTOR PROTECTION AND THE WORK OF THE COMMISSION. MOREOVER, THE COMMISSION WILL RECOGNIZE CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS FOR THEIR LONG YEARS OF DEDICATED SERVICE. IN ADDITION, AWARDS WILL BE CONFERRED ON SELECTED MEMBERS OF THE STAFF BY CERTAIN EXTERNAL ORGANIZATIONS.

WITHOUT QUESTION, THE PERSONS BFING
HONORED HERE TODAY HAVE EARNED THESE
AWARDS. HOWEVER, THE COMMISSION IS
KEENLY AWARE THAT THE HONOREES HAD SUPPORT
AND COOPERATION FROM THEIR SUPERIORS,
THEIR PEERS AND THEIR SUBORDINATES.

IN A MANNER OF SPEAKING, THEREFORE, THE HONORS GIVEN HERE TODAY ARE BEING CONFERRED ON THE TOTAL STAFF. ACCORDINGLY, I OFFER MY APPRECIATION TO ALL THE STAFF FOR YOUR CONTRIBUTIONS AND DEDICATION DURING THE PAST YEAR. AT THIS TIME I AM DELIGHTED TO PRESENT CHAIRMAN RUDER.

RUDER:

THANK YOU, GEORGE, AND GOOD MORNING TO THE MEMBERS AND STAFF OF THE COMMISSION AND TO OUR DISTINGUISHED GUESTS AS WELL.

THIS IS MY FIRST OPPORTUNITY SINCE MY SWEARING-IN CEREMONY TO SPEAK TO THE TOTAL STAFF. I SAY TOTAL STAFF SINCE THESE CEREMONIES ARE BEING VIDEO TAPED AND WILL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE STAFF IN THE REGIONAL AND BRANCH OFFICES AS WELL AS TO THOSE HERE IN WASHINGTON WHO COULD NOT JOIN US AT THIS HOUR.

WHEN I TOOK THE OATH OF OFFICE AS CHAIRMAN, I REMARKED THAT "THESE ARE TRULY AMAZING TIMES IN OUR FINANCIAL MARKETS" AND THAT, IN MY VIEW, "THE ROLE OF THE SECURITIES AND Exchange Commission is crucial". I went ON TO SUGGEST THAT WE MUST "CONTINUE VIGOROUS OVERSIGHT OF THE OPERATION OF THE SECURITIES MARKETS, AND THE ACTIVITIES OF THE SELF-REGULATORY ORGANIZATIONS". AS HAS BEEN DEMONSTRATED BY RECENT TURBULENT MARKET ACTIVITY, THESE ARE NOT ONLY AMAZING TIMES, THEY ARE AMAZINGLY COMPLEX TIMES. THE ACTIVITIES OF OUR MARKETS HAVE WORLD-WIDE IMPACT. IT WILL TAKE THE VERY BEST THAT THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION --BOTH MEMBERS AND STAFF -- CAN PRODUCE

TO PRESERVE THE HONESTY AND FAIRNESS OF OUR SECURITIES MARKETS.

THE PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF CONGRESS HAVE PRAISED THE COMMISSION'S PERFORMANCE DURING THE RECENT MARKET CRISIS. YOU, THE MEMBERS AND STAFF, HAVE REINFORCED MY LONG HELD VIEW THAT THE COMMISSION IS THE BEST OF FEDERAL AGENCIES. INDEED, SINCE JOINING THE COMMISSION, I HAVE BEEN REINFORCED IN MY PRIOR OPINION THAT THE COMMISSION STAFF IS EXTREMELY ABLE, CREATIVE AND SUPPORTIVE. THE COMMISSION AND PUBLIC CANNOT ASK FOR MORE THAN THAT, AND I AM APPRECIATIVE AND PROUD. I WILL CONTINUE TO DO ALL THAT I CAN TO INCREASE OUR RESOURCES IN ORDER THAT WE MAY CONTINUE AS THE BEST FEDERAL AGENCY. I AM DELIGHTED TO PARTICIPATE

IN THESE CEREMONIES AND TO GIVE MY
PERSONAL THANKS TO YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT.

RUDER:

I NOW HAVE THE PLEASURE OF INTRODUCING OUR KEYNOTE SPEAKER.

BEEVIS

BEVIS LONGSTRETH IS A GRADUATE OF PRINCETON UNIVERSITY AND HARVARD LAW School. He served for two years in THE MARINE CORPS. FOR 20 YEARS, UNTIL July of 1981, Mr. Longstreth PRACTICED LAW WITH THE NEW YORK LAW FIRM OF DEBEVOISE & PLIMPTON. HE WAS ADMITTED TO PARTNERSHIP IN 1970, SPECIALIZING IN CORPORATE, FINANCE, BANKING AND SECURITIES LAW. MR. LONGSTRETH WAS APPOINTED BY PRESIDENT REAGAN AS THE 60TH COMMISSIONER OF THE SEC IN JULY 1981 AND REAPPOINTED IN 1982. IN 1984. HE RETURNED TO DEBEVOIS & PLIMPTON. SINCE THEN IN ADDITION TO HIS LAW PRACTICE BEVIS HAS BEEN A LECTURER AT COLUMBIA LAW SCHOOL, TEACHING A

MODERN SOCIETY. HE HAS ALSO
LECTURED ON VARIOUS SECURITIES AND
CORPORATE LAW TOPICS FOR THE
PRACTISING LAW INSTITUTE AND AT
OTHER SEMINARS, HAS WRITTEN NUMEROUS
ARTICLES ON BUSINESS-RELATED SUBJECTS,
MOST RECENTLY HE HAS AUTHORED
MODERN INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT AND THE
PRUDENT MAN RULE, A BOOK PUBLISHED
BY OXFORD UNIVERSITY PRESS IN FEBRUARY
1987.
