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- Sec. 31. [80A.31] STATUTORY POLICY. This act shall be so construed as to effectuate its general purpose to make uniform the law of those states which enact it and to coordinate the interpretation of this act with the related federal regulation.
- Sec. 32. REPEAL AND SAVING PROVISIONS. Subdivision 1. The provisions of Minnesota Statutes 1971, Chapter 50, are repealed.
- Subd. 2. Prior law exclusively governs all suits, actions, prosecutions, or proceedings which are pending or may be initiated on the basis of facts or circumstances occurring before August 1, 1973.
- Subd. 3. All effective registrations under prior law, all administrative orders relating to such registrations and all conditions imposed upon such registrations remain in effect so long as they would have remained in effect if this act had not been passed. They are considered to have been filed, entered, or imposed under this act, but are governed by prior law.
- Subd. 4. Prior law applies in respect of any offer or sale made within one year after the effective date of this act pursuant to an offering begun in good faith before its effective date on the basis of an exemption available under prior law.
- Subd. 5. Judicial review of all administrative orders as to which review proceedings have not been instituted by the effective date of this act are governed by prior law.

The Division's 1980 Budget consisted of \$775,800 appropriated from the State General Fund and \$140,659 in dedicated funds. The dedicated funds are collected from real estate licensees pursuant to Mn. Stat. § 82.34 and are used exclusively for the purposes described therein.

The division generated revenues of nearly \$3 million, the primary source of which were licensing and registration fees.

During 1980 an emphasis was placed on addressing needed changes to the rules and laws relevant to several of the eleven statutes which the Division administers. The Real Estate Education Research and Recovery Fund (Minn. Stat. § 82.34) was amended to provide substantially greater relief to individuals who have been financially harmed due to the dishonest or fraudulent acts of Minnesota real estate licensees. A comprehensive review of the securities rules was begun, especially those rules affecting a small company's ability to raise capital. It is anticipated that these rules will become effective in fiscal year 1981. Advisory groups were organized to examine the laws relating to franchises and subdivided land. These groups met on a regular basis and many of their recommendations were incorporated into the Division's 1981 legislative proposals.

In addition to the amendments to the Real Estate Education, Research and Recovery Fund several other important developments in the area of real estate occurred during 1980. Effective in November of 1980 the Securities Division will be renamed as the Securities and Real Estate Division. This change was intended to better identify the agency's major areas of responsibility. In addition, the real estate education office, which had been based on the campus of the University of Minnesota since its inception in 1975, was moved to the offices of the Department of Commerce in St. Paul in an effort to improve the coordination between the education and licensing functions as well as to cut costs.

Fiscal 1980 statistics show a general increase in the level of registration activity as compared to the previous fiscal year. Revenues were up by more than 36%. The number of securities registrations slightly decreased during 1980 while the dollar amount of securities registered increased by \$300 million. Applications for subdivided lands, franchises, charitable organizations and municipal industrial development projects increased by 40%, 100%, 40% and 25% respectively.

With the exception of investment advisors, professional fund raisers and collection agencies which showed slight increases, the number of licensees generally decreased since fiscal year end 1979.

The 1980 legislature placed the Continuing Care Facility Act under the Division's jurisdiction. The law will take effect on November 1, 1981 and requires substantive review of application documents and enforcement responsibilities.

The enforcement section handled an estimated 8,000 complaints which resulted in approximately 1,000 investigations. Three hundred fifty-three of those were conducted as formal investigations which resulted in the issuance of 101 administrative orders and fifteen criminal referrals.

It appears that there is a definite correlation between the increased volume of complaints which occur during periods of adverse economic conditions and the apparent violations of the statutes, specifically those which pertain to misuse of client funds.

During 1980 the division's enforcement actions involved more than \$5 million in losses to Minnesota investors and was responsible for the recovery of half of that amount to consumers.
